The Ministry Site Profile, known as the MSP has been completed (by the MSP committee). The Ministry Site Profile describes our mission so candidates can understand who St. Johns is. This now has been submitted to the synod so possible candidates can review what St. Johns wants in a future pastor. How does obedience relate to my disability? I feel blessed every day to get up, hopefully to enjoy a sunny day and thankfully to share my day with Rhonda, and those who may stop by to visit. There are days I just can't comprehend the blessing of living another day, maybe even another year on my ALS journey. A journey that all odds makers have said should have ended a few years ago. I believe each breath God gives has a purpose and is a gift. That's not to say that my life is getting easier because it's not. My disability grows each day and does get harder. I believe I need to acknowledge my hardships without letting them define me. One of my favorite authors and a mentor that I never met is Chuck Swindoll. I love his following statement: "If I'm told that the road to my glorious destination is marred by loose rocks and potholes, every jolt along the way reminds me that I'm on the right road". I want to cry when I think about my boyish sermon as I think about traveling to our heavenly destination on either the high road or the low road. I think it's never too late to travel that high road or even to reroute my journey, even if it is filled with potholes and problems. My understanding is that Jesus walked that same road as I have, so it is easy to follow a God who has walked my road with even greater potholes and greater suffering. I think that obedience in my life helps me to enjoy my worship with God more fully. I've had to learn obedience during the suffering in my ALS journey even if ALS is not what I would've chosen for myself. My prayer continues to be that I learn from this suffering and that I remember to remain faithful in prayer for others who are also suffering. I desire to remain faithful, potholes and all, as I look to find and travel on that high road I heard about so many years ago.

Prove it!

In *Jesus Christ, Superstar*, King Herod mocks the bound prisoner who's brought to his courtyard. "So, you are the Christ. You're the great Jesus Christ!" he sings. "Prove to me that you're no fool: Walk across my swimming pool!"

Likewise, the Pharisees demand evidence that Jesus is speaking for God (see Matthew 12:38). It's easy to poke fun at them, but have you ever faced a tough decision and thought, "If only God would give me a sign"?

Jesus tells the religious teachers about the "sign of Jonah," a metaphor for his upcoming death and resurrection. Though it's meant to be a sign for all, not everyone accepts it as truth. Luke 16:31 notes that if the rich man's brothers weren't predisposed to listen to Moses and the prophets, then "they will not be convinced even if someone rises from the dead" (NIV). Signs are useful only to people who accept their messages and act accordingly.—adapted from *The Wired Word*

A God with scars

If anyone has ever asked you why a loving God allows suffering, you've probably developed a theodicy. That's a fancy word for defending belief in divine goodness despite evil's existence. Theologians who tackle this profound mystery note that God himself wasn't spared from pain. Despite his sinlessness as true God, Jesus endured crucifixion as true man. As proof of that sacrifice, his body was scarred.

Those marks feature in a poem by English pastor Edward Shillito. Seeing wounded combatants return from World War I, he wondered how the Gospel could seem like good news to them. When Shillito realized that Christianity alone features a God who suffered, he wrote "Jesus of the Scars" to offer comfort and hope. The poem concludes:

The other gods were strong; but thou wast weak;
They rode, but thou didst stumble to a throne;
But to our wounds only God's wounds speak;
And not a god has wounds, but thou alone.

What we do know is this: Jesus invited us to be a part of the redemptive movement He started when He was here. It's a pretty extraordinary invitation, and it's easy to understand.
