Pause Ponder Pray

Just pray and trust God and He will provide.

Years ago, I read an effective approach to pray that has helped me stay focused on how to have a conversation with our Creator.

Think of it as the "Finger Prayer"!

Step One: Look at your thumb. This is the finger closest to us, so it can represent those that are nearest to us. The list may include family, co-workers, friends, etc.

Step Two: The Pointer finger. This finger represents those who point us to Christ. Our church leaders, ministers who have guided us. We can ask God to give them strength and guidance in their lives and ministries.

Step Three: The tallest finger stands for people in high places. Our governmental leaders. We can ask God to give them wisdom to help them clearly see the answers that allows them to lead in a way that has a servant's heart.

Step Four: The fourth finger – the weakest one. Let that finger remind us to pray for those around us who are weak, whether they are sick, or going through financial or emotional tough times. Whatever they need God can help.

Sam had a ministry to alcoholics for a long time. He was blessed to be able to help some of them get beyond their challenges. Joe was a young man who lived in a nearby town. Sam spent a lot of time with Joe. Joe had been addicted to alcohol but had finally overcome his habit and made it to 8 months sober.

One Saturday, Sam was in the parking lot of the church in Joe's town. Suddenly a pickup truck came around the corner and pulled up right beside Sam. Sam realized it was Joe, who invited Sam to get in the truck. When Sam got in, there was a six-pack of beer on the seat. Sam asked Joe what was going on.

Joe said, "I woke up this morning at six o'clock, so nervous I couldn't be still. I just had to have a drink. I couldn't control myself. BUT I thought of you." "I don't know if you know it or not, but the Lord had you standing in the middle of this parking lot on a Saturday morning. Do you do that every Saturday?" Sam answered NO.

Joe said. "The Lord had you here this morning. If you hadn't been here this morning, I would have been drunk in another hour. Thank God you're here. Thank you that you're here."

We need to be aware there are people around us who need us just like Joe who need a helping hand, a word of encouragement, or just to know that someone else cares enough about them to lift them up in prayer.

Step Five: The little finger on our hand. It represents ourselves. After we pray for those who are close to us, lead our church, who hold other positions of authority and those who are weak, then we can pray for ourselves.

It might seem like we would get to ourselves and our own needs quickly, but once we get into that conversation with God, we start remembering all the other people around us who really need something first. When we pray for other people, we see them in a different light, and we see our own lives in a different light as well.



Holy Cross Day

My children were playing when my seven-year-old said, "Mama, we've got a question." My five-year-old asked, "What color thread does God use?" Perplexed, I sought an explanation. My oldest replied, "When God sews, like Grandma. What color thread does God use?" With my face conveying my confusion, my youngest said, "You know. For God so loved the world. What color thread does God use to sew love?"

My children did not know that *sew* and *so* are two different words, but their wonderment got me thinking. The word that we translate "so" is used to express and absolute or to intensify. The "so-love" of God, therefore, is an absolute love, a love intensified beyond any other.



Meeting called to order by Amy Bazile at 6:45 p.m. Melissa opened with devotions and prayer.

The mission statement was read together.

<u>Member Comments</u>: A get well card will be sent to Pastor Jill. Action team reports will be added to the newsletter to update congregation of "happening" at the church.

Closed Session: none


The next meeting will be on September 19, 2023, at 6:45 pm.
