#### Preachers and People

A few weeks ago, I was reading a devotion and the story reminded me of the "farewell" article Shirl Tischauser wrote in the January Spirit Alive newsletter.

There was a famous preacher of another generation, and in the community where he lived, there was an intellectual agnostic. As the story goes, people had tried time and again unsuccessfully to get him to come to church. Finally, he agreed. He told a friend he would go for two months but did not believe it would do any good. So, the preacher, knowing that the man was coming, decided to spend extra time preparing sermons that could address the faith for an intellectual agnostic. He worked and worked, and when the time came, articulately delivered his messages.

At the end of the two months, when the invitation was given, the agnostic stepped into the aisle, came forward and said he would like to profess Christ as his savior and be baptized. It was a remarkable miracle!!

The great preacher exclaimed his joy, and then asked which one of his sermons had been the turning point.

However, the man admitted that none of the preacher's sermons did the trick. Instead, he told him that every week when he came to church, he noticed a woman who did not have much money, did not have much education, and had been through a lot. Nevertheless, her face glowed and he wished he had the faith she did.

He went on to relate that the previous week he had tripped on the way out the door of the church, and the woman had reached down and grabbed him by the elbow to pull him up. "When our eyes came face to face," he said, "she looked at me and simply said, 'Do you love Jesus like I love Jesus? And has Jesus changed you like he has changed me?' And I had to say no." The agnostic, then, became a Christian because of what the woman had said and done.

The truth is most people are not converted by sermons or Sunday School lessons. Those things help. But most people come into the faith because SOMEBODY else simply looks them in the eye and shows them a changed life. That is the kind of credibility that makes a difference.

St John's has adopted SOUL -serving other uplifting lives. Opportunities abound in our church and our community. As the woman in the story asked, do we love Jesus like she loved Jesus? What difference can you make?



Meeting called to order by Amy Bazile at 6:45 p.m. Mary opened with devotions and prayer.

The mission statement was read together.

**Member Comments:** Several members mentioned that the church was decorated beautifully for Christmas.

<u>Secretary's Report</u>: The meeting minutes for November 2023, were reviewed. A motion was made by Ron, seconded by Wanda, to approve the Council minutes as presented. Motion carried.

<u>Treasurer's Report</u>: A motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Brian, to approve the November 2023 financial statements as presented. Motion carried.

**New Business:** Items of New Business considered were:

- <u>Quarterly Benevolence</u> A motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Wanda to disburse the quarterly benevolence as follows: Homme \$200, Giving Tree \$200, Goodfellows \$200, Backpack Program \$300, and the ELCA \$2100. Motion carried.
- <u>Foundations for BeFriender Ministry</u> A church in Waupaca is using the BeFriender Ministry to assist with the current pastor shortage. This program trains members in many different areas. Here are just a few: how to visit shut-ins, assisting members who are getting married or divorced, grief counseling, hospitalizations, etc. for a fee. If any member of the congregation is interested in learning more, please contact the church office.
- Youth Events Coordinator The council would like a committee formed, not a single individual.
- Any Other New Business –

Quake – Currently, four children are interested in attending. A female and male chaperone will need to attend as well. The church youth fund will pay half per student, along with one female chaperone and one male chaperone. The first youth portion is due by January 4 and remaining balance by February 1. Fundraising will be required to put money back into the youth account. A motion was made by Kelly, seconded by Linda to pay half of the admission for each youth, one female and one male chaperone from the Youth Fund. Motion carried.

#### **Action Team Reports:** The following Action Team reports were provided:

- <u>Property</u> We have received the grant money for the AED. Brian Ewald will come to finish up the class room under the sanctuary after the 1<sup>st</sup> of the year. The estimated cost for the wiring and outlets in the Club Room is \$2000. The roof has been fixed above the Great Room.
- <u>Worship and Music</u> The votives will be replaced for All Saints Sunday next year. Pastor Lois has agreed to help with the Lenten Services. The Last Supper rendition will happen on Maundy Thursday service.

#### **Closed Session**: none

The next meeting will be on January 16, 2024 at 6:45 pm.

The meeting closed with the Lord's Prayer.

Being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
