Reflections

Three Minutes at a Time -Part II

Nearing the front of the line one day, I decided to thank this kind man for what he did each day and for the way he welcomed strangers like me each morning. When I got to the front of the line, I reached out my right hand as I handed my ID to him with my left. "Hi, I'm Bob," I said. "I've passed by you a dozen times and I just wanted to thank you for the way you treat each person in line. It's amazing. The way you treat people reminds me a lot of the way Jesus loved."

The small man looked up slowly from my driver's license and handed it back to me as if it were his. He didn't say a word, but I could see his eyes well up. He took a couple of small steps toward me, then he wrapped his arms around me and put his head on my chest. "I'm Adrian," he said into my sweater. I'll admit, it was more than a little awkward. But there we stood, just the two of us, slow dancing at the front of the TSA line while 150 business travelers who were late for their flights watched. This was the beginning of my friendship with Adrian, three minutes at a time. We said our goodbyes and I was already looking forward to my next trip to the airport and the next chance to learn a little bit more about him.

A few days later, I got my chance. During our next three minutes together, I found out about Adrian's wife, Patricia. On subsequent trips, I found out about his son, a daughter, a grandchild, a brother, and a previous career he had with Aero Mexico as an electrician.

What I liked about Adrian the most was he knew who he was. I also was struck by how authentic he was with his growing faith. Humble people don't fall for the lies pride tries to entice us with to fake it. After a particularly bad day, God's first words in the garden to Adam and eve were simple ones: "Where are you?"

It's the first post-screwup conversation between God and the first family. God, of course, wasn't talking about geography when He asked the question, and He's not asking us about it now either. He hadn't lost track of the ones He had created, and He hasn't lost track of you and me. Instead, I think God wanted Adam and Eve to figure out where they were with Him after they'd failed. He's never stopped asking us the very same question. "Where are you?" To figure out where we are we need to understand who we are, It's the question Adrian asked thousands of people every day: "Who are you?"

A few of us pretend we're at a different place in our faith than we really are. We pretend to be someone we're not, hoping we'll find more love, respect, or popularity or get more attention. There usually isn't a bad motive underlying this; we do it because we're insecure or we're looking for approval or we're reaching for a way to connect with the people around us. Yet when what our faith looks like becomes more important than what it is, it's evident we've forgotten who we really are. God constantly allows things to happen in our lives that help us understand where we are with Him and who we really are in the context of our circumstances. It's like He's checking our IDs every day, not unlike what Adrian did at the airport.

The thing about Adrian is he was never confused about his identity. He didn't have a Facebook page where he projected who he wished he were. I never saw him take a selfie. These aren't bad things, of course, but they can lead us away from ourselves. Adrian was just a guy who loved God, loved his family, and loved the next person who was standing in front of him.
